Merry Christmas! Hope you had a great Thanksgiving and are making plans for a great Christmas.

I have a question for you. It's something I've been thinking about lately and I've been praying about it. What should we do when someone in your family or in our church family does something that hurts us. I'm not talking about physical hurt, but hurt that is the result in their actions and speech. Maybe it is a thoughtless word or an omission of some kind. It hurts you, but they may not even realize that that they shot an arrow in your direction and it was a direct hit. How are we supposed to react to these arrows?

When I get hit by one of these arrows, it actually hurts in my heart. I feel sad and helpless in how to heal from it. Is confrontation the way to handle it? Do I just ignore the hit and keep on keeping on without ever saying anything to the person responsible? How does Jesus want me to handle this? How do I get over it?

Here are some helps that I have discovered in researching how I can learn to deal with these situations. A website called compellingtruth.org advises that difficult people are everywhere. Rude, selfish, impatient, mean folks are out there. (Romans 1:29-31; II Timothy 3:1-4; Galatians 5:19-21). What is shocking to us is that we can behave and act in the same way as these people. We all have the seeds of these attitudes in our hearts. (Matthew 15:19). So the first step to help us deal with difficult people is knowing that by nature we are no better than they are. As believers in Christ our direction from Jesus is not to get even or return evil for evil but to return evil with good (Roman

- ◆ Pray, meditate and/or seek counseling.

So how do I handle the hurt? I pray and turn it over to Jesus. I may have to pray more than once, but eventually the hurt goes away and I am able to stop dwelling on my hurt feelings.

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VIGNETTES by VIRGINIA

AWAY IN A MANGER, one of the favorite Christmas carols, is claimed to have been written by Martin Luther. It was first published under the title, "Luther's Cradle Hymn" in 1887 and written for children. German mothers have been singing this special song to their families for many years.

The carol is thought to be American in origin by musicians Williams J. Kirkpatrick, (1895) and James Ramsey Murray (1887) writing the words for verses one and two. The third verse was written in 1892 by Charles H. Gabriel, although credit was also given to Martin Luther.

When we read God's Word to relate AWAY IN A MANGER, we turn to Luke 2:4-7. "So Joseph, also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him cloths and placed in a manger because there was no room for them in the inn."

The Advent season is celebrated four Sundays before Christmas. This is a time for the celebration of Jesus' birth AND also a reminder for His Second Coming. Most of us are very busy. This year will definitely be different in unusual ways. Begin new traditions within the families. Learn new songs. Read the Christmas story in another Biblical version and discuss with the children. Let them 'pretend' they are those families traveling to take the census. (Imagination with a true history)

Closing with verse three of AWAY IN A MANGER: Be near me, Lord Jesus! I ask Thee to stay Close by me forever and love me, I pray. Bless all the dear children in Thy tender care. And fit us for heaven, to live with Thee there.

Peter Marshall's prayer, chaplain of the US Senate (1947-1949): "We yearn, our Father, for the simple beauty of Christmas—for all the old familiar melodies and words that remind us of that great miracle when He who had made all things was one night to come as a Babe, to lie in the crook of a woman's arm. Before such mystery we kneel, as we follow the Shepherds and Wise men to bring Thee the gift of our love—a love we confess that has not always been as warm or sincere or real as it should have been. But now, on this Christmas Day, that love would find its Beloved, and from Thee receive the grace to make it pure again, warm and real. We bring Thee our gratitude for every token of Thy love."
